Information**

1.1 Introduction

The all-in-one HSB-660S/I single board computer series is designed for embedded applications where full features and performance are major concerns. The adoption of the various CPU options from Intel® Pentium® III, Celeron® (0.18/0.13 micron up to 1.4GHz) to VIA C3™ processors (up to 1.1GHz), HSB-660S/I series brings with its significant gains in performance. HSB-660S/I series is powered by the VIA Twister T system chipset.

An integrated AGP 4X 2D/3D graphics accelerator is also provided. With Dual channel TTL interface, the HSB-660S/I series supports TFT-DSTN LCD displays and CRT monitor simultaneously. It also provides up to 1600x1200 resolution for CRT and 1024x768 resolution for LCD 18bpp colors with UMA 32MB display memory.

Excellent connectivity is provided by embedded 10/100Mbps or Gigabit Ethernet connection. One DIMM slot for a total of 512MB RAM memory ensures that users have more than enough memory to handle leading applications. Moreover, one CompactFlash™ Type II slot is supported as external storage. The HSB-660S/I series is fully functional, offering comprehensive I/O support, including 4 USB ports for connecting the latest peripherals. The HSB-660S/I series is equipped with the range of legacy ports, including a parallel port, an IrDA port, and an AC-97 SoundBlaster compatible audio.

Warning!


Always completely disconnect the power cord from your board whenever you are working on it. Do not make connections while the power is on, because a sudden rush of power can damage sensitive electronic components.







Locating connectors and jumpers – HSB-660I




2.6 Setting Jumpers

You configure your card to match the needs of your application by setting jumpers. A jumper is the simplest kind of electric switch. It consists of two metal pins and a small metal clip (often protected by a plastic cover) that slides over the pins to connect them. To “close” a jumper you connect the pins with the clip.

To “open” a jumper you remove the clip. Sometimes a jumper will have three pins, labeled 1, 2 and 3. In this case you would connect either pins 1 and 2 or 2 and 3.

**Open****Closed****Closed 2-3**

A pair of needle-nose pliers may be helpful when working with jumpers.

If you have any doubts about the best hardware configuration for your application, contact your local distributor or sales representative before you make any change.

Generally, you simply need a standard cable to make most connections.

2.7 COM2 RS-232/422/485 Selection - 1 (JP1)

The COM2 port can be selected as RS-232, RS-422 or RS-485 by setting both JP1. The following chart shows the jumper setting.

2.16 Primary IDE Hard Drive Connector (CN4)

You can attach one or two Integrated Device Electronics hard disk drives to the HSB-660S/I internal controller. The HSB-660S/I IDE controller uses a PCI local-bus interface. This advanced interface supports faster data transfer.

Connecting the hard drive

Connecting drives in a daisy-chain fashion requires one of two cables, depending on the drive size.

Wire number 1 on the cable is normally red or blue, and the other wires are usually gray.

1. Connect one end of the cable to CN4, and make sure the red (or blue) wire corresponds to pin 1 on the connector, which is labeled on the board (on the right side).

2. Plug the other end of the cable to the IDE hard drive, with pin 1 on the hard drives. (Please see your hard drive's documentation for the documentation for the location of the connector.)

Connect a second drive as described above.

Unlike floppy drives, IDE hard drives can connect to either end of the cable. If you install two drives, you will need to set one as the master and the other as the slave by using jumpers on the drives. If you install just one drive, set it as the master.

2.17 Floppy Drive (CN5)

With support of different types of floppy, you can simply adopt any of the combinations of 5.25" (360 KB and 1.2 MB) and/or 3.5" (720 KB, 1.44 MB, and 2.88 MB) drives onto the mainboard.

A 34-pin daisy-chain drive connector cable is required for a dual-drive system. On one end of the cable is a 34-pin flat-cable connector. On the other end are two sets of floppy disk drive connectors. Each set consists of a 34-pin flat-cable connector (usually used for 3.5" drives) and a printed-circuit board connector (usually used for 5.25" drives). Wire number 1 on the cable is normally red or blue, and the other wires are usually gray.

Connecting the floppy drive

1. Plug the 34-pin flat-cable connector into CN5. Make sure that the red or blue wire corresponds to pin 1 on the connector.
2. Attach the appropriate connector on the other end of the cable to the floppy drive(s). You can use only one connector in the set. The set on the end (after the twist in the cable) connects to A: drive. The set in the middle connects to B: drive.
3. If you are connecting a 5.25" floppy drive, line up the slot in the printed circuit board with the blocked-off part of the cable connector.

When connecting a 3.5" floppy drive, you may have trouble determining which pin is pin number 1. Look for a number printed on the circuit board indicating pin number 1. Also, the connector on the floppy drive connector may have a slot. When the slot is up, pin number 1 should be on the right.

Check the documentation that came with the drive for more information.





BIOS Setup**

3.1 System Test and Initialization

These routines test and initialize board hardware. If the routines encounter an error during the tests, you will either hear a few short beeps or see an error message on the screen. There are two kinds of errors: fatal and non-fatal. The system can usually continue the boot up sequence with non-fatal errors. Non-fatal error messages usually appear on the screen along with the following instructions:

Press <F1> to RESUME

Write down the message and press the F1 key to continue the boot up sequence.

When you should encounter fatal errors, please contact your distributor or sales representative.

System configuration verification

These routines check the current system configuration the values stored in the CMOS memory of the board. If they do not match, the program outputs an error message. You will then need to run the BIOS setup program to set the configuration information in memory.

There are three situations in which you will need to change the CMOS settings:

You are starting your system for the first time

You have changed the hardware attached to your system

The CMOS memory has lost power and the configuration information has been erased.

The HSB-660S/I CMOS memory has an integral lithium battery backup for data retention. However, you will need to replace the complete unit when it finally runs down.

3.2 Award BIOS CMOS setup

Awards BIOS ROM has a built-in Setup program that allows users to modify the basic system configuration. This type of information is stored in battery-backed CMOS memory so that it retains the Setup information when the power is turned off.

Some items in the BIOS are programmed to auto detect your system. The presence or the values of these items vary with the corresponding hardware specification of your system.

- **Entering setup**

Power on the computer and press immediately. This will allow you to enter Setup. The top menu offers users various functions to configure the system. The default page after entering the BIOS setup is [Main – Standard CMOS setup].

- **Major Setup Features:**

- ◇ **Main – Standard CMOS Features**

Use this menu for basic system configuration. (Date, time, IDE, etc.)

- **Advanced Features Setup**

Use this menu to set the advanced features available on your system.

- ◇ **Advanced BIOS Features**

Use this menu to set the advanced features available on your system.

✧ **Advanced Chipset Features**

Use this menu to change the values of the chipset registers and optimize your system performance.

✧ **Integrated Peripherals**

Use this menu to specify your settings for integrated peripherals. (USB, Serial port, Parallel port, keyboard, mouse etc.)

✧ **Power Management Setup**

Use this menu to specify your settings for power management. (HDD power down, power on by events, KB wake up, etc.)

✧ **PnP/PCI Configurations**

This entry appears if your system supports PnP/PCI.

● **Default – Load Optimized Defaults**

Use this menu to load the BIOS default values that are factory settings for optimal performance system operations. While AWARD has designated the custom BIOS to maximize performance, the factory has the right to change these defaults to meet their needs.

● **Security – Set/Change Password**

Use this menu to set Supervisor/User Passwords.

● **PC Health Setup**

This menu allows you to set the shutdown temperature for your system.

- **Clk/Voltage Setup**

Use this menu to specify your settings for auto detect DIMM/PCI clock and spread spectrum.

- **Exit**


Save & Exit Setup -- Save CMOS value changes to CMOS and exit setup.

Exit Without Saving -- Abandon all CMOS value changes and exit setup.


Standard CMOS setup








You can set the password to restrict unauthorized access to enter or change the options of the setup menus.

NOTE: To clear the password, simply press Enter when asked to enter a password. Then the password function is disabled.





3.9 Exit Setup



- **Save & Exit Setup**

- **Exit without saving**

Selecting this option and pressing <Enter> lets you exit the Setup program without recording any new values or changing old ones.

**Driver
Installation**

The HSB-660S/I comes with a CD-ROM which contains most of drivers and utilities of your needs.

There are several installation ways depending on the driver package under different Operating System application.

Please follow the sequence below to install the drivers:

Step 1 – Install System Driver

Step 2 – Install VGA Driver

Step 3 – Install LAN Driver

Step 4 – Install Audio Driver

For installation procedures of each driver, you may refer to section 4.1-4.2.

4.1 Installation 1:

Applicable for Windows 2000/98

1. Insert the HSB-660S/I CD-ROM into the CD-ROM Drive.
2. From the CD-ROM, select the desired component Driver folder, and then select the desired Operation System folder to double click on the **Setup.exe** icon. A driver installation screen will appear.
(Notice 1 : For LAN Driver, please first find the corresponding chip code folder according to your onboard chip code, then follow the instruction 2.)
(Notice 2 : Take VGA driver installation under Windows 98 for example, choose the corresponding folder depending on your OS.)
3. A driver installation screen will appear, please follow the onscreen instructions to install the driver in sequence and click on the Next button.
(Notice: In some cases the system will ask you to insert Windows 98 CD ROM and key in its path. Then click on the OK button to key in path.)
4. Click on the **Finish** button to finish installation process. And allow the system to reboot.

Note: For Gigabit Ethernet driver, please always refer to the latest driver on AAEON website. (www.aaeon.com)

4.2 Installation 2:

Applicable for Windows 2000/ 98

1. Insert the **HSB-660S/I CD-ROM** into the CD-ROM Drive.
2. Click on **Start** button, select the **Settings**, and then click on the **Control Panel** icon.
3. Double click on the **Add/Remove Hardware** icon and **Add New Hardware Wizard** will appear. Click on the **Next** button.
4. Select **Search for the best driver for your device (Recommended)** and click on the **Next** button.
5. Select **Specify a location**, click on **Have Disk** button then key in the CD-ROM path and specify component drivers and OS folders. Then click on the **Next** button.
6. The Wizard shows that Windows driver file search for the device. Click on the **Next** button.
7. The system will ask you to insert Windows 98 CD ROM. Click on the **OK** button to insert CD-ROM and key in path.
8. Click on the **OK** button.
9. Click on the **Finish** button to finish installation process. And allow the system to reboot.

A.1 How to install the CompactFlash card cover



Please follow the steps below to install the CompactFlash Card cover. The instructions are simply for your reference which mean you may install the CompactFlash Card cover in the way you prefer.


Step 1: Plug in CompactFlash Card




Step 2: Push the CompactFlash Card forward until the end.




Step 3: Put the cover on from the right to left and hook up the CompactFlash Card white base with the crook on the cover.






Step 4: Press a little bit with the finger on the hole of the cover.



Step 5: Done




A.2 How to disassemble the CompactFlash card cover
