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Chapter 2

Motherboard information

2.1 Before you proceed

Take note of the following precautions before you install motherboard components or change any motherboard settings.




CAUTION!

- Unplug the power cord from the wall socket before touching any component.
- Before handling components, use a grounded wrist strap or touch a safely grounded object or a metal object, such as the power supply case, to avoid damaging them due to static electricity.
- Hold components by the edges to avoid touching the ICs on them.
- Whenever you uninstall any component, place it on a grounded antistatic pad or in the bag that came with the component.
- Before you install or remove any component, always remove the AC power by unplugging the power cord from the power outlet. Failure to do so may cause severe damage to the motherboard, peripherals, or components.

Standby Power LED

The motherboard comes with a standby power LED that lights up to indicate that the system is ON, in sleep mode, or in soft-off mode. This is a reminder that you should shut down the system and unplug the power cable before removing or plugging in any motherboard component. The illustration below shows the location of the onboard LED.



EMB-H110B Onboard LEDs


2.2 Motherboard layout

CAUTION! Do not overtighten the screws! Doing so can damage the motherboard.






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2.3.2 Solder side

The motherboard comes with a surface mount LGA1151 socket designed for the Intel® 6th/7th Generation Core™ i7 / Core™ i5 / Core™ i3, Pentium® / Celeron® processors.

IMPORTANT: Unplug all power cables before installing the CPU.




CAUTION!

- Upon purchase of the motherboard, ensure that the PnP cap is on the socket and the socket contacts are not bent. Contact your retailer immediately if the PnP cap is missing, or if you see any damage to the PnP cap/socket contacts/motherboard components. The manufacturer will shoulder the cost of repair only if the damage is shipment/transit-related.
- Keep the cap after installing the motherboard. The manufacturer will
 process Return Merchandise Authorization (RMA) requests only if the
 motherboard comes with the cap on the LGA1151 socket.
- The product warranty does not cover damage to the socket contacts resulting from incorrect CPU installation/removal, or misplacement/loss/ incorrect removal of the PnP cap.






2.4.2 CPU heatsink and fan assembly installation








To uninstall the CPU heatsink and fan assembly









2.6 Jumpers

1. Clear RTC RAM (CLRTC)

This jumper allows you to clear the Real Time Clock (RTC) RAM in CMOS. You can clear the CMOS memory of system setup parameters by erasing the CMOS RTC RAM data. The onboard button cell battery powers the RAM data in CMOS, which include system setup information such as system passwords.



EMB-H110B Clear RTC RAM

To erase the RTC RAM:

- 1. Turn OFF the computer and unplug the power cord.
- 2. Move the jumper cap from pins 1-2 (default) to pins 2-3. Keep the cap on pins 2-3 for about 5~10 seconds, then move the cap back to pins 1-2.
- 3. Plug the power cord and turn ON the computer.
- 4. Hold down the **** key during the boot process and enter BIOS setup to reenter data.



CAUTION! Except when clearing the RTC RAM, never remove the cap on CLRTC jumper default position. Removing the cap will cause system boot failure!




NOTES:

- If the steps above do not help, remove the onboard battery and move the jumper again to clear the CMOS RTC RAM data. After clearing the CMOS, reinstall the battery.
- You do not need to clear the RTC when the system hangs due to overclocking. For system failure due to overclocking, use the CPU Parameter Recall (C.P.R) feature. Shut down and reboot the system so the BIOS can automatically reset parameter settings to default values.

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



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2.7 Connectors

2.7.1 Rear panel connectors



- 1. DC-In power jack. This jack connects to a DC power adapter.
- HDMI[™] ports. These ports are for High-Definition Multimedia Interface (HDMI[™]), and are HDCP compliant, allowing playback of HD DVD, Blu-ray, and other protected content.
- USB 3.0 ports. These 9-pin Universal Serial Bus (USB) ports connect to USB 3.0/2.0 devices.




NOTES:

- DO NOT connect a keyboard / mouse to any USB 3.0 port when installing Windows® operating system.
- Due to USB 3.0 controller limitation, USB 3.0 devices can only be used under Windows® OS environment and after the USB 3.0 driver installation.
- We strongly recommend that you connect USB 3.0 devices to USB 3.0 ports for faster and better performance for your USB 3.0 devices.
- LAN (RJ-45) ports. These ports allow Gigabit connection to a Local Area Network (LAN) through a network hub. Refer to the table below for the LAN port LED indications.

- Line Out port (green). This port connects to a headphone or a speaker. In a 4-channel, 6-channel and 8-channel configurations, the function of this port becomes Front Speaker Out.
- 6. Microphone port (pink). This port connects a microphone.



2.7.2 Internal connectors

1. SATA power connector (4-pin SATA_PWR)


This connector is for the SATA power cable. The power cable plug is designed to fit this connector in only one orientation. Find the proper orientation and push down firmly until the connector completely fit.

2. Audio amplfier connector (4-pin AMP_CON)

This connector is for an internal stereo amplifier speakers support (2W/4 Ω via WtoB header).




EMB-H110B Audio Stereo Output with Amp connector

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3. CPU and chassis fan connectors (4-pin CPU_FAN1, 4-pin CHA_FAN1)

Connect the fan cables to the fan connectors on the motherboard, ensuring that the black wire of each cable matches the ground pin of the connector.

CAUTION: Do not forget to connect the fan cables to the fan connectors. Insufficient air flow inside the system may damage the motherboard components. These are not jumpers! Do not place jumper caps on the fan connectors!




NOTE: The CPU_FAN connector supports a CPU fan of maximum 2A (24 W) fan power.

4. LVDS connector (40-pin LVDS)

This connector is for an LCD monitor that supports Low Voltage Differential Signalling (LVDS) interface.




EMB-H110B LVDS connector

5. Chassis intrusion connector (4-1 pin CHASSIS)

This connector is for a chassis-mounted intrusion detection sensor or switch. Connect one end of the chassis intrusion sensor or switch cable to this connector. The chassis intrusion sensor or switch sends a high-level signal to this connector when a chassis component is removed or replaced. The signal is then generated as a chassis intrusion event.


By default, the pins labeled "Intruder" are shorted with a jumper cap. Remove the jumper caps only when you intend to use the chassis intrusion detection feature.

6. Digital I/0 connector (10-pin DIO)

This connector includes 8 I/O lines (In/Out programmable). All of the Digital I/O lines are programmable and each I/O pin can be individually programmed to support various devices.



EMB-H110B DIO connector



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7. Front panel system panel connector (10-1 pin F_PANEL)

This connector supports several chassis-mounted functions.

System power LED (2-pin +PWR_LED)

This 2-pin connector is for the system power LED. Connect the chassis power LED cable to this connector. The system power LED lights up when you turn on the system power, and blinks when the system is in sleep mode.

Hard disk drive activity LED (2-pin +HDD_LED)

This 2-pin connector is for the HDD Activity LED. Connect the HDD Activity LED cable to this connector. The IDE LED lights up or flashes when data is read from or written to the HDD.

ATX power button/soft-off button (2-pin PWR_BTN)


This 2-pin connector is for the system power button.

Reset button (2-pin RESET)

This 2-pin connector is for the chassis-mounted reset button for system reboot without turning off the system power.

8. Serial ATA 6.0Gb/s connectors (7-pin SATA6G_1/2)

These connector connects to Serial ATA 6.0 Gb/s hard disk drives or an optical drive via Serial ATA 6.0 Gb/s signal cables.




EMB-H110B SATA 6.0Gb/s connectors

9. Speaker connector (4-pin SPEAKER)


The 4-pin connector is for the chassis-mounted system warning speaker. The speaker allows you to hear system beeps and warnings.

EMB-H110B MINICARD connectors



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11. USB 2.0 connectors (10-pin USB56, USB78)

These connectors are for USB 2.0 ports. Connect the USB cable to these connectors. These USB connectors comply with USB 2.0 specification that supports up to 480 Mbps connection speed.






EMB-H110B SPI programming connector



EMB-H110B Inverter connector



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15. Serial port connectors (10-pin COM1, COM2)

These connectors are for serial (COM) ports. Connect the serial port cables to these connectors, then install the module to a slot opening at the back of the system chassis.





This connector is for an internal embedded DisplayPort connection.




EMB-H110B Embedded DisplayPort

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18. Front panel audio connector (10-1 pin AAFP)

This connector is for a chassis-mounted front panel audio I/O module that supports either HD Audio or legacy AC`97 audio standard. Connect one end of the front panel audio I/O module cable to this connector.

IMPORTANT!

- We recommend that you connect a high-definition front panel audio module to this connector to avail of the motherboard's high-definition audio capability.
- If you want to connect a high-definition front panel audio module to this
 connector, set the Front Panel Type item in the BIOS setup to [HD]; if you
 want to connect an AC'97 front panel audio module to this connector, set
 the item to [AC97]. By default, this connector is set to [HD].

2.8 Power Supply Considerations



CAUTION!

- The external DC jack (5.5/2.5mm) is the primary power input connector of EMB-H110B. However, the desktop board also provides an internal 2 x 2 power connector that can be used in custom-developed systems that have an internal power supply.
- There is no isolation circuitry between the external DC jack and the internal 2 x 2 power connector. It is the system integrator's responsibility to ensure no more than one power supply unit is or can be attached to the board at any time and to ensure the external DC jack is covered if the internal 2 x 2 power connector is to be used.
- Simultaneous connection of both external and internal power supply units could result in potential damage to the desktop board, power supplies, or other hardware.
- System power requirements will depend on actual system configurations
 chosen by the integrator, as well as end user expansion preferences. It
 is the system integrator's responsibility to ensure an appropriate power
 budget for the system configuration is properly assessed based on the
 system-level components chosen.
- Considering the power conversion efficiency between Vin (+12V), the Vout (+12V) output voltage is set around 11.6V.

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Chapter 3

BIOS setup

3.1 BIOS setup program

Use the BIOS Setup program to update the BIOS or configure its parameters. The BIOS screens include navigation keys and brief online help to guide you in using the BIOS Setup program.

Entering BIOS Setup at startup

To enter BIOS Setup at startup:

Press <Delete> during the Power-On Self Test (POST). If you do not press <Delete>, POST continues with its routine.

Entering BIOS Setup after POST

To enter BIOS Setup after POST:

- Press <Ctrl>+<Alt>+ simultaneously.
- Press the reset button on the system chassis.
- Press the power button to turn the system off then back on. Do this option only
 if you failed to enter BIOS Setup using the first two options.



NOTE: Using the power button, reset button, or the <Ctrl>+<Alt>+ keys to reboot a running operating system can cause damage to your data or system. Always shut down the system properly from the operating system.



IMPORTANT:

- The default BIOS settings for this motherboard apply to most working conditions and ensures optimal performance. If the system becomes unstable after changing any BIOS settings, load the default settings to regain system stability. Select the option Restore Defaults under the Save & Exit Menu. See section 3.7 Save & Exit.
- The BIOS setup screens shown in this section are for reference purposes only, and may not exactly match what you see on your screen.

3.1.2 Menu bar

The menu bar on top of the screen has the following main items:

MainFor changing the basic system configuration.AdvancedFor changing the advanced system settings.ChipsetFor viewing and changing chipset settings.SecurityFor setting up BIOS security settings.

Boot For changing the system boot configuration.

Save & Exit For selecting the exit options and loading default settings.

To select an item on the menu bar, press the right or left arrow key on the keyboard until the desired item is highlighted.

3.2 Main menu

The Main menu provides you an overview of the basic system information, and allows you to set the system date, time, language, and security settings.

3.2.1 System Date [Day MM/DD/YYYY]

Allows you to set the system date.

3.2.2 System Time [HH:MM:SS]

Allows you to set the system time.

3.3 Advanced menu

The Advanced menu items allow you to change the settings for the CPU and other system devices.



Be cautious when changing the settings of the Advanced menu items. Incorrect field values can cause the system to malfunction.

Case Open Warning [Disabled]

Allows you to enable or disable case open warning function. Configuration options: [Disabled] [Enabled] [Clear]

3.3.1 CPU Configuration

The items in this menu show CPU-related information the BIOS automatically detects.



The items shown in the submenu may be different depending on the type of CPU installed.

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Hyper-threading [Enabled]

This item saves current configuration as User Default.

Restore User Defaults

This option restores User Defaults to all setup options.
